GARDENER PROFILE: SAMMY HOWELL

"Sometimes you can't wait," he says. "You hear the birds chirping and the squirrels dancing and you just want to get out in it." And so he does.



When Kansas City Community Gardens needs someone to get gardens ready to plant, we often turn to Sammy Howell.

Sammy is the go-to guy for the big tilling jobs. With a tiller attached to the back of his tractor, Sammy can till gardens quickly and efficiently provided, he says, that he can get through the gate if there is a fence.

Sammy modestly estimates he has tilled

more than 1,000 community and home gardens since 1998, when he started helping KCCG.

Earlene Franks, KCCG administrative assistant, assigns most of the tilling work for KCCG, and she says Sammy's tractor/tiller combination allows KCCG to do the much larger gardens quickly. A tilling job that would require someone to push a tiller all day takes Sammy only an hour, she says.

Sammy does almost all the gardens measuring more than 3,000 square feet. He has a "fan club" at KCCG - people ask for him every year. Earlene says some gardeners only want Sammy to come to their home to till.

But Sammy does more than just tilling for KCCG. He is an asset to Kansas City Community Gardens in several ways. A member of the Board of Directors and its Program and Marketing Committee, he always is willing to volunteer his time and talents. He stops by the KCCG office in Swope Park daily during the gardening season. If the office is busy or gardeners are working outside, he is always willing to help carry an extra load of fertilizer or help a new gardener pick out seeds and plants. He also achieved quite a bit of fame at the Fall Family Festival last September when he brought his horses for the children to ride.

Sammy grew up in Tullahassee, Okla. His father died when he was two years old. His mother and grandparents had a garden and that was his first introduction to gardening. Eventually, after attending college and working for a time, he took a job at Hallmark in shipping. He was employed at Hallmark for 27 years, met his wife there, and retired in 2002. He and his wife have property where they have a garden, and he also participates at his church's large community garden.

Despite being busy, Sammy takes time to grow a variety of good foods in his gardens, where he plants tomatoes, sweet potatoes, mustard and collard greens, corn, and green beans, among other things. His favorite veggie to grow is eggplant, just because "I like to see them grow." In fact, he likes to see just about anything grow, and this year he planted some crops even earlier than usual because of the warm weather.

City Council Restores Funding For KCCG

As many of you know, KCCG was recently in danger of losing funding from the City of KCMO. The funding, which comes from the Community Development Block Grant program (CDBG), was in jeopardy when KCCG was excluded from this year's budget.

KCCG has been receiving CDBG funding for over 20
years. For the past several years, we have received \$35,000
annually (7% of our budget). This funding is a very important
part of our budget because it provides money for tilling gardens
and improvements for community gardens.

KCCG gardeners and supporters overwhelmed us with support. Many wrote and called their city council representatives and a large group of KCCG gardeners and friends attended the CDBG hearing to show support of KCCG. KCCG supporters also testified on behalf of KCCG at the city budget hearing. We are thankful for all of your efforts. Just last week,

the City Council responded and voted to put KCCG back in the budget for \$35,000.

GGKC - Mini Grant Funds High Tunnel at Niles Home



The mission of Get Growing Kansas City (GGKC) is to get more good food growing in Kansas City. GGKC's mini-grant program helps achieve this mission by taking applications from urban farms and community gardens to assist with projects up to \$3,000.

GGKC, a collaborative effort between Kansas City Community Gardens, Cultivate Kansas City, and Lincoln University Cooperative Extension, is funded by the Health Care Foundation of Greater Kansas City. After receiving many requests for assistance with community gardens and farms, HCF reviewers saw the need to help make funding available to groups trying to get good, healthy food into their communities and mini grants were established as part of the GGKC program.

The first round of mini grants was reviewed and awarded by the GGKC mini grant review team in the first part of this year. Three projects were funded, including Niles Home for Children's Garden, Whatsoever Community Garden, and an urban farmer - Lay Htoo. All were excellent proposed projects that, once implemented, will increase the amount of food being grown in the Kansas City area.

In mid-March, Niles Home for Children implemented the major part of its GGKC mini-grant request, which was buying the materials to build a high tunnel. A high tunnel is often described as an unheated greenhouse. The basic function is to extend the growing season and, in some cases, make year-round production possible. Patrice Gros of Foundation Farm in Arkansas, a well-known no-till farmer, designed the tunnel at the Niles Garden. Marty Kraft, head grower at Niles, has followed the no-till system and wanted also to replicate the high tun-

nel design Patrice had developed. The tunnel is fairly simple, using galvanized pipe, wooden hip boards, and greenhouse quality plastic. The total cost was less than \$1,400 and took two days to construct.

Marty plans on utilizing the tunnel right away, planting grafted tomatoes as soon as they are big enough to go out. In the fall he hopes to plant overwintering crops which could be harvested throughout the winter. As residents and students from the Niles Home engage in the garden, learning how to plant, care for, and harvest food, this tunnel adds a new dynamic to the Niles garden, increasing the food produced and the teaching possibilities.

The second round of mini grants has just been awarded. Look for more news on the exciting projects coming out of that grant cycle. There are still three more rounds for minigrant funding. For more information on these GGKC grants visit www. getgrowingkc.org.
